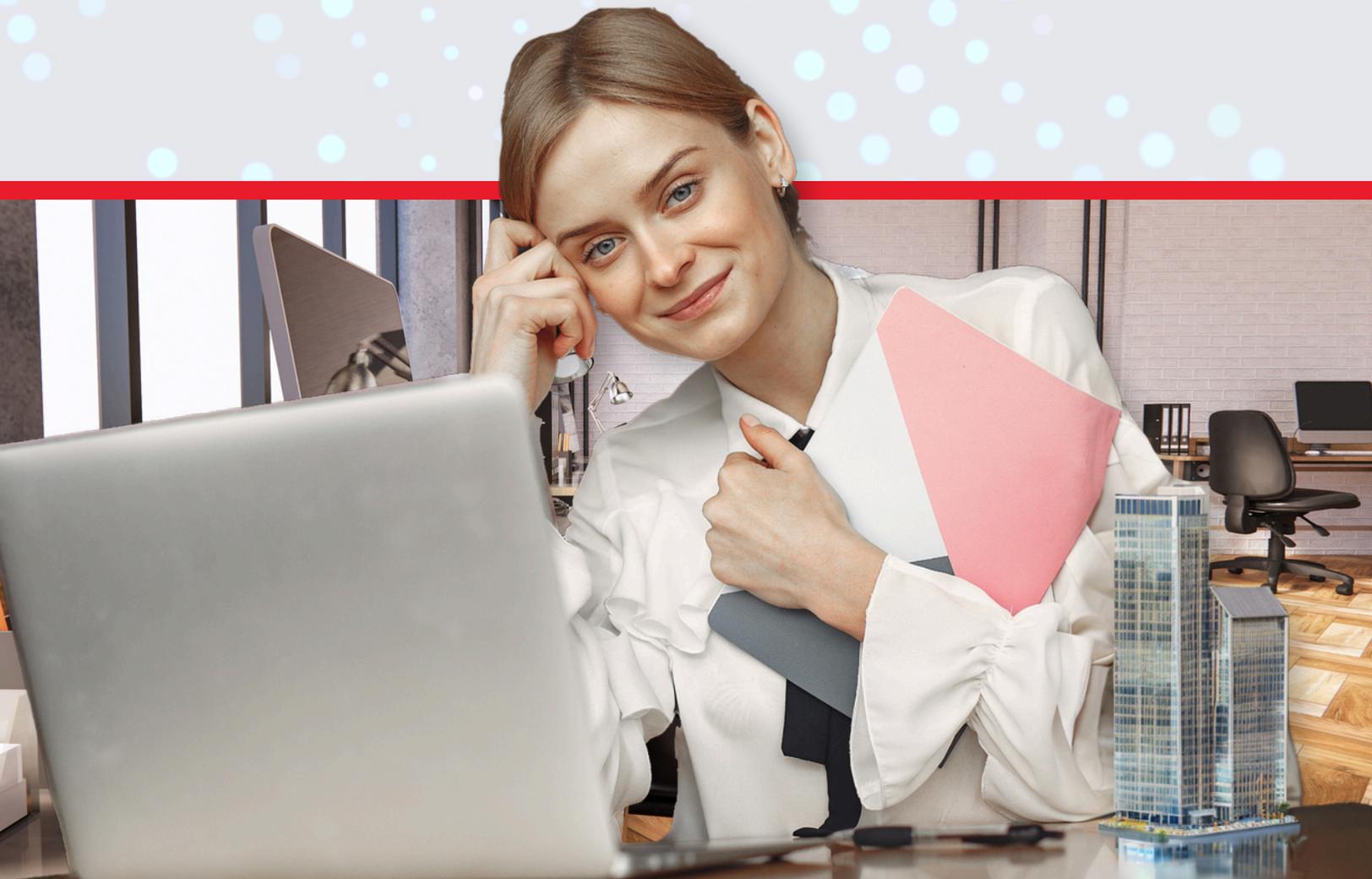

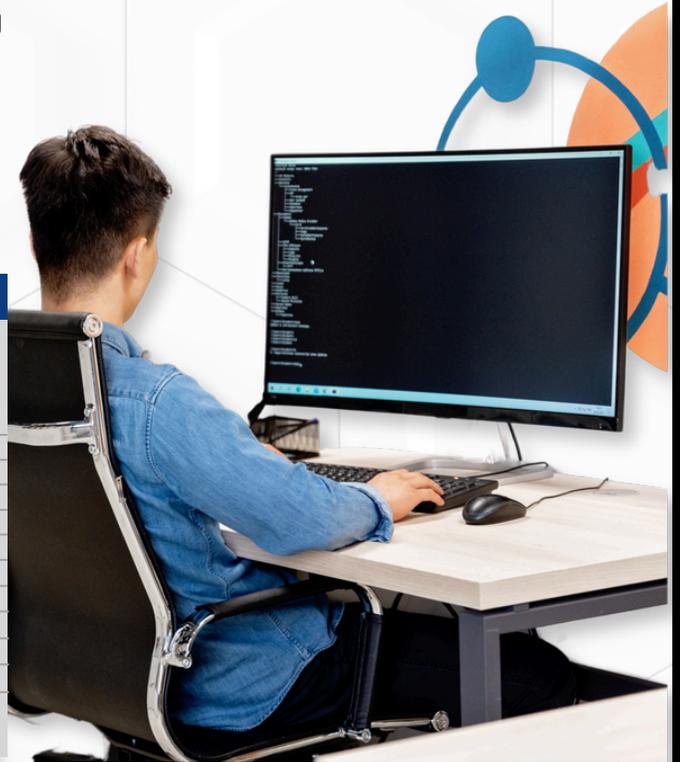
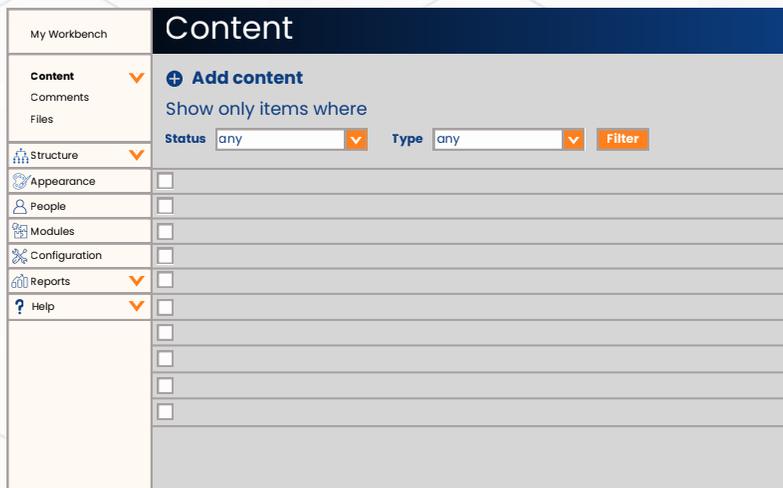

Donor Management Systems:

Better Outreach, Better Relationships

Businesses rely on **customer relationship management (CRM)** software, and some nonprofits have **adopted** these tools for use with **donors** and **volunteers**. But it isn't exactly a hand-in-glove fit. Your relationship with donors, volunteers, and others isn't really the **same** as a business's relationship with its customers.

Enter donor management systems. Multiple are available, including **Donor Perfect**, **Tapestry**, and **Exceed**. These take the principles of CRM software and tailor them to make the **most sense** for nonprofits and NGOs. You'll gain a better understanding of who your donors are and what contact you've had with them (something that becomes increasingly difficult as your nonprofit scales). You'll also gain tools for communicating **effectively** at scale, leading to **increased donations** and better overall relationships with the people who care about your cause.

Volunteer Management Software: Activate and Focus Your Volunteers at Scale

Nonprofits rely on volunteers to perform all kinds of **functions**, including both key **day-to-day functions** and big **scalable projects**. Especially for those one-off project and events, getting the right number of bodies in the right place at the right time is a **challenge** – and if those people need to be trained or oriented? **Things can get complicated in a hurry.**

Volunteer management software can help here. It's a bit like scheduling software, but for volunteers, and it's built with an understanding of how the volunteer-nonprofit relationship is **different** from the **worker-employer relationship**.

Just like with the previous category, there are other **mass-market products** that can kind of do the job here. But **purpose-built volunteer management software** will do a **better job**, freeing your team up to focus more on the good that you're doing and less on moving bodies around an event space (or names around a spreadsheet).

Collaboration Software: Work Together Better, Even When Apart

Many nonprofits are used to collaborating under **less-than-ideal circumstances**. This may or may not be your day job, but it definitely isn't for your volunteers. So often there's plenty of after-hours work.

Others such as board members or specialists that provide a service to your nonprofit may not be on site often (**or may not even live in your city**).

Good news: the shift toward remote work in certain sectors has led to the creation of all kinds of **collaborative tools** your nonprofit can adapt!

This broad category includes:

- **Video calling** or **videoconferencing tools** like Zoom, GoToMeeting, Teams, or Google Meet (free with Google Workspace!)
- **Whiteboard** or **brainstorming apps** like Whiteboard and Jamboard
- **Collaborative workspaces** and **chat tools** like Teams and Slack
- **Screen sharing** and **presentation tools** like Loom, Wistia, and Camtasia



4 REASONS YOUR NONPROFIT SHOULD WORK WITH A **MANAGED SERVICE** PROVIDER

The tools in the previous section can help any nonprofit **improve operational effectiveness**, but tools alone will **never** deliver the **best possible results**. Improving your effectiveness through technology requires the right partnerships alongside the right tools.
